District 23C Environment Committee

It has been a successful year for the District NexTrex plastic film recycling program championing on one of the Lions' five global causes - Environment. This program offers the perfect avenue to collect and recycle plastic film materials that typically would be discarded and end up in our landfills. The program has the added bonus that when a Club collects at least 500 pounds of plastic film Trex® will donate a high-performance composite bench to their community made from the recycled materials.

Four clubs - Ledyard, Montville, Middlefield, and North Stonington reached their goal, collected 500 pounds of plastic film material, and qualified for a free Trex® bench:

The Willimantic Club started the NexTrex Challenge in March and the Old Saybrook Club is about to start. Several Clubs in our District are also participating in the challenge by collecting plastic film and donating it to one of the other participating clubs such as Ledyard or North Stonington.

To help our Clubs promote the program, Trex® provides posters and recycling collection bins to the club.

Distributing these collection bins around our communities increases the awareness of another recycling opportunity for plastic that is not easily recycled. In North Stonington, the Sr. Center held a special informational program at one of their weekly luncheons on the NexTrex Challenge and plastic film recycling after receiving one of the recycling bin.

Once you start collecting the plastic film you begin to realize the enormous Bulk that 500 pounds of plastic film occupies. Trex® estimates that it takes about 40,500

plastic bags to reach 500 pounds. Another estimate is that one large black plastic garden waste bag holds about 7 pounds of plastic film. Therefore, it takes over 70 large black plastic bags to reach 500 pounds. That number of bags roughly fills the floor space of a two car garage.

Thanks to all of the Lions Clubs and individuals that have contributed to making this project a success. We have made a significant

contribution to improving our environment. Please contact me if you have any questions. I am happy to talk with your Club about the NexTrex Challenge.
